WHAT IS AIR FORCE ROTC?

Air Force ROTC is a college program that allows you to earn your degree while training to become an Air Force officer. Air Force ROTC offers challenges and benefits that will foster individual growth above and beyond the traditional college experience. While in the program, you will build character as well as leadership and management skills. After completing all of your degree and training requirements, you will be commissioned as a second lieutenant in the United States Air Force.



GENERAL REQUIREMENTS

In order to **participate** in Air Force ROTC, you must be a full time student at a participating school (see back of pamphlet). In order to **complete** the program you will need to:

- Be physically and medically qualified
- Be of good moral character
- Be in good academic standing
- Pass the Air Force Officer Qualifying Test (AFOQT)
- Complete Leadership Evaluation and Development Training (~18-day summer course)
- Degree completion



SCHOLARSHIPS

Scholarships - Are very competitive! They may be offered that pay up to full tuition, fees, and textbooks. Contracted cadets will also receive a monthly stipend.

High School Seniors - There are 4 year scholarships available on a competitive basis to high school seniors. Visit www.afrotc.com to start your application.

College Students - Qualified students enrolled in the AFROTC program are eligible to compete for scholarships if they meet the requirements. Selection is based on GPA, physical fitness, standardized test scores, and overall performance as a cadet.



AFROTC CURRICULUM

The curriculum is divided into the General Military Course (GMC) and the Professional Officer Course (POC) for underclassmen and upperclassmen, respectively. The GMC lecture classes are one-credit courses and the POC lecture classes are three-credit courses. Coursework includes Air Force history, general military knowledge, leadership, management, and national security policy. Both GMC and POC cadets also participate in a weekly leadership laboratory, where they engage in a variety of activities, including group leadership projects and drill and ceremonies. In addition to lecture and LLAB, cadets participate in physical training sessions.



All cadets are required to attend Leadership Evaluation and Development Training (LEAD), an 18-day summer course, usually completed between sophomore and junior year. LEAD is a physically and mentally challenging series of group projects, fitness activities, and leadership exercises.

Maryland Honor Guard
